

## **May Letter**

Dear Friends,
I wonder whether like me you
ever have days when you wish
there was someone you could talk
to, someone by your side,
someone who would pray for you
when you can't find the words,
someone with the understanding
and authority to speak up for
you?

Would it surprise you to know that actually there is someone to do all these things and much more besides? The person I am talking about is someone whose presence and support we especially remember and celebrate this month, on 19<sup>th</sup> May, Pentecost Sunday. That someone is God the Holy Spirit.



On that first Pentecost Sunday, the Holy Spirit came upon the disciples shortly after Jesus had ascended into heaven, just as he had promised. Gathered in prayer in an Upper Room, the disciples heard a noise like a rushing wind and there appeared what looked like tongues of fire resting on each of them.

Empowered by the Spirit, they rushed out onto the streets of Jerusalem and shared about Jesus' death and resurrection. Two thousand people responded and were baptised that very day. Effectively the church was born. You can read all the details in Acts chapter 2.

But the Holy Spirit was at work long before Pentecost. In Genesis 1 we can read of his part in creation. Less dramatic, but just as important, are the ways the Holy Spirit can help us in our walk with Jesus everyday. Jesus explained the role and work of the Spirit in John chapters 14, 15 and 16. Here we learn that he is not some strange or weird force we need to be alarmed about, rather he is sent by the Father and the Son.



When Jesus promised to be with us always, he was referring to the way the Holy Spirit lives in the heart of every Christian. This means we can talk (pray) to him

any time, wherever and whenever we want, and he listens and hears us. The Spirit is always by our side, no matter what we are going through. We can ask him to strengthen and support us, and provide us with guidance about the right things to do and say.

When we don't know how to pray Heather about a situation, the Spirit is right there to help. Paul writes We do not know what we ought to pray for, but the spirit himself intercedes for us with groans that words cannot express. And he who searches our hearts knows the mind of the spirit, because the spirit intercedes for the saints in accordance with God's will.

(Romans 8: 26& 27). When we need someone to come to our defence and speak up for us, again, this is the work of the Holy Spirit.

And so the Holy Spirit is our Comforter, Counsellor, Advocate, Intercessor. He teaches us and reminds us of the ways of Jesus and leads us into all truth. Individually, when we work with him, he grows his fruit in our hearts. As the church, when we look to him, he blesses us with his gifts.

As we celebrate Pentecost this year, let's make time to pray and to consider how we can be open to all the Spirit wants to do with us and in us.

# Christian Aid Week 12-18th May 2024

### **Extraordinary Love.**

We reflect together on God's love and the call to love our neighbours. We follow the story of Aline Nibogora, from Makamba Province in Burundi. Aline has experienced abuse and extreme poverty but she has found ways to persist in faith, hope and love.

And now faith, hope, and love remain, these three, and the greatest of these is love.

1 Corinthians 13:13

Push back against Poverty this Christian Aid Week



Poverty is an outrage against humanity. It robs people of their dignity and lets injustice thrive. Aline Nibogora, a determined mother in Burundi, was pushed to the brink of survival by poverty. She suffered abuse at the hands of her husband and was forced to flee. He then turned the community against her. Aline lost almost everything. Separated from her children, she had to sleep on the streets. ' People forgot I was human' she told us 'I don't want my children to have a painful life like mine.'

Aline's situation is not unique. Burundi is one of the poorest countries in the world. The global cost of living crisis has intensified the challenges families face, and now malnourishment and poverty affect more than 70% of the population, putting them on the edge of survival. In there own areas where Christian Aid work people without their own small business or income often head out on an empty stomach each morning to look for casual work to buy food for the evening. Most only eat once a day. What and how much they eat depends on. The work they find that day.

Coming back from the edge isn't easy when food can be scarce, disease prevalent and jobs hard to come buy.

But there is hope. Together we can push back against the inhumanity of extreme poverty.

#### **Aline's Story**

Aline's business was successful and she was able to rent a house. At last she was reunited with her three eldest sons who came to live with her

Now Aline is baking her own bricks and building a stronger home for her family, in every sense.

Aline told Christian Aid: 'We pray together as we are still alive thanks to God's grace. ... We have been through difficult times, but now we make plans for the future.



Our retiring collection on Sunday 12th May will be used to train villagers like Aline's to form a Village Savings and Loans Association (VSLA) That will support people to grow food, buy medicine and improve their living conditions. Together, we can help ensure more people in Burundi get the skills and knowledge they need to fulfil their ambitions and hopes. We can help families plan for a better future that they'll build together.

## Church Lawton to host Fish and Chip Supper, Beacon Lighting and 40'S Party Night to Commemorate D-Day Landings

Church Lawton is planning to commemorate the 80<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the D-Day landings in 1944 - the largest naval, air and land operation in history - in style.

All Saint's Church. Church Lawton Parish Council and Lawton Memorial Hall have been planning events for some time to enable to the community to come together to remember, give thanks and celebrate this historic occasion.

On June 6, there is an invitation for people of all ages to come together as the church bells toll to share **A Peace Supper** at Lawton Memorial Hall before walking to the church to hear the International Tribute and witness the lighting of the beacon at 9.15pm. As it is National Fish and Chip Day (moved to this day to support the commemoration) on 6 June, supper will be fish and chips!

On Saturday evening, the hall will again be opening its doors to celebrate 80 years of peace with a **Forties Party Night** of fun with a chance to get into the 40's spirit by dressing in costume, singing war time classics, dancing the swing and jive and having a good time 40's style. All the proceeds from the ticket sales will be donated to the Royal British Legion in memory of those who lost their lives during the D-Day landings.

'We are also hoping to be able to pay tribute to local heroes from the World War 2 and acknowledge the part local people played in those conflicts. A call out to local people who

may have stories, photographs, etc of family from that time is being made so that we can create an archive of **Church Lawton at War.** This will be on display during the events,' announced Margaret Blease-Bourne, Chair of the Operational Committee at the Hall. 'If you have photographs, stories, newspaper cuttings about Church Lawton in World War 2, please email



## Recycling & Green Living Tips

How to reduce microplastic pollution in your laundry



Your laundry could be leaking microplastics. Microplastics have been linked to heart attacks, fertility issues and cancer - and are found everywhere from clouds to our bloodstreams. These tiny plastic particles come from larger plastics that have broken down, with synthetic clothing a key culprit. Humans consume up to 52,000 microplastic particles per year, according to a 2019 study by scientists in Canada.

#### 1.The type of fabric

Polyester garments shed the most - up to 1,900 fibres per wash. Clothing and textiles made of upcycled single-use plastics are problematic, even though they are seen as environmentally friendly. The property of fabrics also impacts shedding, with tightly woven fabrics with longer fibres less likely to emit high levels of microplastics. Nylon fares

better, shedding around eight times less than polyester. Most pieces of clothing shed the worst on their first wash. Another reason to opt for quality clothes that you can reuse for a long time, rather than buying into throwaway fast fashion.

#### 2. The wash temperature

Cooler wash cycles could reduce the amount of microfibres that shed. It's easier on your clothes and can help them to last longer. Cotton cycles that run at high temperatures of around 60°C with a high spin rate place more stress on clothing leading microfibres to shed.

#### 3. The load

Full loads also help to reduce friction on clothing, further lowering microplastic shedding.

#### 4. Drying

Air-drying clothes on a washing line prevents further microplastic leakage caused by using a tumble dryer.

#### Detergent

Washing powder can increase microfibre shedding, so using less can help make a wash more sustainable. Two tablespoons per load for clean clothes is advised. Avoid pods

coated in PVA which dissolves in water. This is neither safe nor biodegradable as has been claimed. Opt for plasticfree detergent brands and shop at refill stations to reduce your impact.

#### 6. Filters

Filters that catch microfibres can be installed in washing machines. In 2020, France mandated that every new washing machine must have one of these by 2025. A similar law has been introduced in Australia and campaigners are calling for it to be introduced in the UK too. They retain up to 90 per cent of microfibres and can be retrofitted onto an existing washing machine. They must be cleaned regularly with fibres being deposited in waste disposal. If you are purchasing a new clothes washer, opt for one with a microfibre filter built in. Front loading washing machines have also been found to release fewer fibres due to their softer tumbling motion.

#### The World's E-Waste Has Reached a Crisis Point

A new UN report finds that humanity is generating 137 billion

pounds of TVs, smartphones, and other e-waste a year—and recycling less than a quarter of it. If you can't repair it and have to discard it, the device will become e-waste, joining an alarmingly large mountain of defunct TVs, fridges, washing machines, cameras, routers, electric toothbrushes, headphones.

This electrical and electronic equipment aka EEE i.e. anything with a plug or battery is increasingly out of control. In 2022, humanity churned out 137 billion pounds of e-waste—more than 17 pounds for every person on Earth—and recycled less than a quarter of the equipment.

Humanity must quickly bump up those recycling rates, the report stresses. So make sure you repair your devices when possible and recycle when they are finished with. Most recycling centres have bins for electronic and electric waste.




